Year 6 – Art KCV – War & Peace

Key facts to learn:

• Children will be able to discuss and share technique's used in creating a number of different forms of art inspired by War & Peace. A variety of mediums will be used to expand knowledge and skills in showing their art forms. Children will be able to recognise the art work of Henry Moore, and how his style created emotion and feeling. Children will work an assortment of textiles and sewing techniques to create a stuffed toy/ Christmas decoration understanding the importance of cutting and measurement.

Key skills to do:

- To be able to express feeling and emotion through art.
- To investigate and evaluate products with lever and linkage systems
- To experiment with a range of techniques to create moving mechanisms.
- To investigate and analyse items made using textiles: the materials used and how they are made
- To explore some ways in which textiles are joined and decorated
- To use pattern pieces to measure, mark and cut fabric; to sew design elements according to a design.
- To join fabric pieces by hand sewing
