Prior Learning

- Children will know about singing, how their voices can sing sounds in various ways, creating various sounds.
- Children will know about singing, how their voices can sing sounds in various ways, creating various sounds.
- Children will have a basic knowledge about a tempo of a song and how this can change.
- Children will have been exposed to songs of some different genres such as hip hop, Afropop, RnB and Latin.
- Children will understand what the pitch is and how it can be changed.
- Children will have had some experience of improvising, composing, and performing.
- Children will have completed glockenspiel stage 1 in year 3 and had some experience of using one in year 2.

Key Learning

By the end of the term children will have gained the following knowledge and skills:

- Know how to play simple tunes and songs on the glockenspiel.
- Be able to sing and play the glockenspiel at the same time.
- Be able to compare the pitch of the notes on a glockenspiel and compare to other instruments.
- Use musical vocabulary to describe the rhythm and pitch.

Key Concept Questions

- Which keys on a glockenspiel produce the highest pitch?
- What are the similarities and differences between the glockenspiel and other percussion instruments?
- Is it possible to change the dynamics of a glockenspiel?



Subject Specific Vocabulary

Rhythm	a strong, regular repeated pattern of movement or sound.
Pulse	The beat in the music.
Pitch	How high or low the note is.
Structure	the arrangement of a song.
Chorus	A repeated section of a song, often the climax.
Improvise	Create or perform spontaneously without preparation.
Melody	A sequence of notes that make a tune.
Dynamics	the volume of a sound or note.
Tempo	the pace or speed at which a section of music is played.
Compose	Write or create
Keys	The bars on a glockenspiel that you hit to make a sound.
Percussion	musical instruments played by striking with the hand or with a stick or beater, or by shaking.
